



Lakeside Wildlife Trail

Approx 2 km / 1.5 miles Time: 1.5 hours

- Bird life to look out for on the lake from the main path includes: Herons, Mallard ducks, Canada geese and Mute Swans
- You may see Willow fencing in the water, this is bank revetment work. It is done to try and prevent the bank and the path from eroding away into the lake.
- Along either side of the main path you will see
 Willow trees growing.
 These trees are managed by rotational coppicing. Each year a section is cut down.
 The new growth encourages insects and nesting birds.
- House martins and Swallows fly up an down the main path feeding on insects.
- Anglers often fish for Bream and Carp along this stretch of the lake.
 - From the bird hide you may see Great Crested Grebe in winter plumage and groups of Pochard, Tufted and other migratory ducks.

 We regularly feed the migratory ducks with grain, to encourage them to over-winter in the park. From the bird hide you will get a great view of the many birds that use the lake throughout the year.

- 7 Frogs and toads use the area in and around the Leat 'pond' bridge for spawning with Moorhen and Coot sometimes nesting here too.
- Also watch out for the aerial acrobatics of Dragonflies as they fly up and down, feeding on insects along this stretch of grass during the summer.
- 9 If you look out over the lake you may spot a Cormorant.
 These are coastal birds, which have since moved inland to take advantage of the fish stocks in lakes and rivers.
 They are unpopular with anglers because of the large volume of fish they eat.
- Notice on the left one of the remaining sections of wall, which contains stones from the original Augustinian Priory. It is this link to the history of the area, which helped give the park its name. Behind the hedge on the right is the sailing club.
