Description of activity:

The vision of the Bedford Borough Community Safety Partnership (CSP) is "Tackling crime, disorder, anti-social behaviour, drug and alcohol misuse and increasing perceptions about safety and well-being in our communities".

The current CSP Plan covers the period 2017-20 and requires renewal by June 2020. The new CSP Plan will cover the period 2020-23, from April 2020 to March 2023. The theme/priority issues identified and detailed within the Plan will be established for the three years. The CSP has a statutory obligation to undertake an annual Crime and Disorder Strategic Assessment (SA), as a result annually the CSP Plan will be been updated to reflect any changes in priorities as identified as part of the process and in response to changes within the community.

The purpose of the CSP Plan is to set out the priority areas for action by the CSP and its partner agencies by:

- Describing what the CSP aims to achieve over the period 2020 2023
- Outlining the key objectives for each individual priority area
- Giving an overview of how the CSP will work to deliver each priority
- Explaining how the CSP will work in partnership to make the best use of resources
- Explaining how performance will be measured and managed

The priorities developed in the CSP Plan are supported by evidence provided in the 2019 Strategic Assessment. A number of national and local data sets are used in this process:

- ONS Census 2011
- Indices of Deprivation 2019
- JSA and Universal Credit data 2019
- Police Recorded Crime, ASB incidents and Missing Persons data: 2016-2019
- Bedford Borough Council recorded ASB cases
- · Bedford Borough Safeguarding referral data
- ONS Crime Severity Scores
- Public Consultation Data (collected Summer 2019)
- Bedford Borough MARAC and IDVA service data

These large scale data sets were supported by information contributed at a local level from third sector service providers within each priority area.

Evidence of the community's concern and awareness around levels of Crime and ASB are provided by way of a partnership consultation exercise undertaken in 2019.

What consultation did you carry out with protected equality groups to identify your activity's effect on equality?

Extensive public consultations form an important part of the CSPs evaluation process, gathering data around the community's perception of crime and disorder and awareness of emerging issues in both their local area and the Borough as whole.

A Borough Wide public consultation took place over the summer in 2019. The consultation was designed specifically to:

- Understand public perception of progress in terms of tackling crime and ASB
- Understand what contributes to making people feel safe and unsafe
- Gain an understanding of people's concerns about some of the underlying issues that impact on Crime and ASB
- Gain an understanding of people's awareness of new and emerging issues in the Borough

	Understand those issues that cause the greatest level of public concern
	The consultation was delivered as both an online survey and as a face-to-face exercise; distributed by a number of local partners over the period May to August 2019 (1533 respondents completed the survey).

What does this evidence tell you about the different protected groups?	In undertaking the analysis no specific protected equality groups / characteristics (age, gender etc) are <u>unduly</u> affected by the proposal within this plan, however by virtue of some of the work streams involved as part of the CSP, the activities of the CSP will <u>positively affect</u> certain protected equality groups, for example those with disability, race, religion etc.
	Analysis undertaken with the Strategic Assessment has identified a number of protected groups that may be affected by Crime and ASB, either in terms of their increased risk of becoming a victim or in terms of their increased fear or concerns around an issue.
	All three of the CSP priority areas aim to support vulnerable groups and this work will form part of the new CSP specific action plans within each area. There is an overarching aim to both reduce the risk to individuals and to raise awareness of support services.
What further research or data do you need to fill any gaps in your understanding of the potential or known effects of the activity?	A Strategic Assessment will take place each year during the lifespan of the 2020-23 plan. This process includes an evaluation of the previous year's recommendations and looking ahead to the next year of the Plan. The findings within each Strategic Assessment will be use to refresh existing priority areas and address any emerging issues at that time.

Summary of analysis

In preparing this report, due consideration has been given to the Borough Council's statutory Equality Duty to eliminate unlawful discrimination, advance equality of opportunity and foster good relations, as set out in Section 149(1) of the Equality Act 2010. In summary, the result is that the Community Safety Plan 2020-2023 has no overall adverse effect on equality.

The Council has a statutory duty under the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 (Regulations updated June 2011) to have a Community Safety Plan in place that is informed by a Strategic Assessment. It is recognised that the Police alone cannot reduce crime and anti-social behaviour, and that it is by working together in partnership with our local community that we can help to create safer communities.

Every CSP in England is required to produce a three year Plan. This Plan covers the period <u>April 2020 to March 2023</u> and will set out the key strategic aims and priority issues of the CSP for the next three years. As well as establishing a three year plan, the CSP also has a statutory obligation to undertake an annual Crime and Disorder 'Strategic Assessment' (SA); this will continue to be carried out annually to inform the progress of the Plan 2020-2023, the work of partners and the effective delivery of community safety work.

The equalities analysis demonstrates that the Crime and Strategic Assessment analysis and evidence gathering process is robust enough to inform the Community Safety Plan priorities. The evidence shows that the Partnership considers discrimination through the strategic assessment process, partnership delivery process and is discussed at a strategic level. There are appropriate processes in place to deal with offenders and provide a level of support to victims prioritised through a Risk Assessment process.
