#### **Description of activity:**

The council currently has 4 remaining Automatic Public Conveniences (APC) and 2 Universal Superloo's (USL) located throughout the borough. JCDecaux agreements – the 4 APC are on a rolling 12-month contract with a **6-month termination notice** period, the remaining two USL – agreements run until 31st August 2023.

This proposal relates to the closure of the remaining 4 JCDecaux Automatic Public Conveniences (APC) at The Broadway, St Peters, Russell Park and Melbourne Street at the natural end of 6 month notification period being proposed for – 08 April 2016.

#### This will leave:

Two Universal Superloo's (USL) located at Bedford Park East and Addison Howard Park.

In the Town Centre the council has also 3 attended Public Convenience Facilities at Allhallows, St Paul's Square (with Mayes Yard semi-automatic) and Lurke Street. There are also 2 unattended facilities at Russell Park Toilet kiosk and Mowsbury Park (East - Wentworth Drive).

9 Business signed up to the Community Toilet Scheme which supports the network of Toilets within the Town Centre The provision of public conveniences is a Discretionary Service.

A small number of respondents commented on the potential impact for elderly people, parents with young children and disabled people.

# What does this evidence tell you about the different protected groups?

As result of this activity the following groups may be affected, mobility impaired, disabled, gender reassignment.

- Utilities bills which provide the costs of providing this service per facility, this shows which facilities are used most as in regards to water and electric costs. It identifies if a proposed facility to be closed is used more than another one or not It would not directly show anything in relation to a protected group.
- Database information on Damage / Repair/ Vandalism Reports / Costs Not broken down by equality group. This breaks down information on costs relating to either repair, vandalism or damages. A large amount of Vandalism occurs at unattended Public Conveniences. In the period of time (1<sup>ST</sup> April 2012 to 06 January 2016) since the data has been recorded on APP database there have been 232 records regarding APC's 140 for Damage/ repair; 58 cases of vandalism. This is likely to escalate due to having no attendants monitoring routinely which provides a natural surveillance resource and deterrent. The up keep of the facilities is covered under a maintenance agreement with the Contractor. If higher levels of vandalism occur fewer

people will be able to use the service. - It would not directly show anything in relation to a protected group.

- Complaints & Compliments No complaints or compliments received. This information found on the department's database known as APP provides information regarding which toilet facility has received praise or complaints from users. (1<sup>ST</sup> April 2012 to 06 January 2016), 2 complaints received for Town Centre Public Conveniences.
- Usage Information shows amount of Users Not broken down by equality group other than RADAR key user amounts. Statistics highlight that none of APC's have shown a constant increase since 2009 (2015 -16 figures area for 7 months / and estimated 12 month)

#### **Summary of analysis**

In preparing this report, due consideration has been given to the Borough Council's statutory Equality Duty to eliminate unlawful discrimination, advance equality of opportunity and foster good relations, as set out in Section 149(1) of the Equality Act 2010.

This activity may initially affect the equality groups, Age, Gender reassignment, and disability due to the reduction of facilities across the Borough. To remedy the effects of this activity steps will be taken to ensure signposting of where relevant similar facilities are available. Bedford Borough Council has already invested in new finger point signage directing to nearest facilities in the Town Centre area. Additional targeted work in liaison with Disability Access officer.

Information on Facilities available is available on the Bedford BID website, and is already available on BBC website, National site <a href="https://www.findatoilet.co.uk">www.findatoilet.co.uk</a> and linked through to the disability website. Consideration to new leaflets and signs with the information will be put in place to minimise affects. Locations are also available on G.I.S database.

Community Toilet Scheme will continue to be promoted to extend the scheme further across Bedford Borough Area.

Section 106 opportunities to be reviewed under the Town and Country Planning Act 1990 which will help with additional Public Toilet provisions in agreements with land developers over these issues i.e. in retail outlets and Supermarkets.

'Age' Equality group – actions by using signs, leaflets will minimise effects on this group and upgrading remaining facilities will benefit this group.

'Disabled' Equality group – actions by using signs, leaflets will minimise effects on this group and upgrading remaining facilities /along with the new Changing Rooms facility will benefit this group

'Gender reassignment, Sex (gender) and Sexual orientation' - actions in reviewing S106 options and ensuring adequate signage

#### to other facilities nearby will benefit this group.

The action plan mitigates against the adverse impacts, and also the council is still providing a service *(non statutory)* albeit reduced to allow service users to use this type of facility, this is not removing the service totally only proposing to close 4 facilities (APC's) out of a total of 6 facilities. The 3 Attended and 2 Unattended Facilities remaining along with the 9 Community Toilet Scheme facilities assists in mitigating the adverse impact.

The findings from the Equality Assessment demonstrate the activity is robust; there is no potential for discrimination or adverse impact. All opportunities to promote equality have been taken.
