Description of activity:

The draft Older Persons' Accommodation Strategy (OPAS) is for the period 2018-2023. When finalised it will replace the OPAS 2011-2016.

Public Consultation on the draft strategy was completed during early autumn 2018. Responses were noted and appropriate changes to the strategy have been made. This Equality Analysis has been completed post public consultation.

The Strategy assesses and identifies the housing needs of older persons – identified in the Strategy as those aged 65 and over - in Bedford Borough.

All local authorities with strategic housing responsibilities need to plan to meet the housing needs of local residents. The Borough Council and its partners have a key role to play in meeting the housing needs of all of the Borough's citizens, in particular those vulnerable members of the community. As part of an overarching Care and Support Accommodation Strategy the Older Persons Accommodation Strategy focuses on the housing needs of Bedford Borough's older population. It analyses the types of accommodation available to older persons and considers their possible future housing requirements.

What consultation did you carry out with protected equality groups to identify your activity's effect on equality?	A public consultation on the draft Older Persons Accommodation Strategy was undertaken in autumn 2018. This consultation offered all sectors of the community the opportunity to comment on how they are affected by the proposed Strategy.
	A number of respondents questioned why Recommendation 7 which states Understand and consider the specific housing needs of older ethnic minority people, particularly those ethnic minority groups with a higher prevalence of disability' and action 1.5 'Investigate the need for an Asian Elders Scheme' had been included. The officers' response was that Under Section 149(1) of Equality Act 2010 the Council has a duty to advance equality of opportunity for protected groups. The strategy considers ethnicity, the growing population of older ethnic persons and the increased likelihood of persons from those communities experiencing disability outcomes at paras 3.39ff.
	The Strategy does not aim to provide a scheme specifically to meet the needs of a particular group, rather that the Council should seek to 'Understand and consider the specific housing needs of older ethnic minority people, particularly those ethnic minority groups with a higher prevalence of disability' (Recommendation 7). Once these needs are understood, the way in which they and our obligations under the Equalities Act 2010 should be met will be clearer.
	It is acknowledged that the action identified at 1.5 'investigate the need for an Asian Elders scheme does not reflect Recommendation 7 and this action will be amended accordingly'
What does this evidence tell you about the different protected groups?	 Age In 2011, there were 12,976 pensioner households in the Borough, of which 7,616 were pensioners living alone. Pensioner households formed 20.3% of all households compared to 20.8% in England and 22.4% in the East of England. Bedford Borough's population rose from 148,100 in 2001 to 163,900 in 2014, an increase of 11%. Growth was concentrated in older age groups, including a 45% rise in the number of people aged 85+.
