Fuel Poverty in Bedford Borough	Warm Homes Project: In 2016, Age UK Bedfordshire secured funding from British Gas for a project to lift people from fuel poverty across Bedfordshire. The project aims to directly support 1,000 people by end of March 2017. Age UK have identified 2,165 older people who are likely to benefit from the programme; to receive an energy efficiency/affordable warmth home-survey and behaviour change guidance; plus, assessment (re: other health and wellbeing related interventions). 847 assessments have been carried out to-date 26.01.2017 (commencing client's 12-week journey of support to achieving affordable warmth). Project clients have been supported with: fuel debt (payment plans); to read meters (including meter-exchange); to use heating systems and controls; to switch energy suppliers (reducing bills by £9,777.47); to receive Warm Homes' Discounts and other entitlements (including minor aids, equipment, adaptations); 2,635 items of energy efficiency equipment have been supplied/installed free of charge by Age UK Handypersons; home repairs have been organised; and, social isolation reduced (outings, befriending, gardening services and onwards referrals: Sight Concern, Ready Meals; Occupational therapists, etc.).321 older people in Bedford Borough were visited by Age UK, and 229 have been provided with energy saving equipment. 47 clients have been assisted with claiming benefits, resulting in £176,161.65 claimed and £5,110.64 was saved in clients' energy bills when they were assisted with switching.  The council is working with third parties in order to support the Government's statutory target to 'ensure that as many fuel poor homes in England as is reasonably practicable achieve a minimum energy efficiency rating of a Band C by 2030', and the interim milestones of Band E by 2020, and Band D by 2025. Housing Strategy 2016-20	The Housing Strategy Review builds on the Housing Strategy 2012-17 and extends it up to 2020. A key theme of the Strategy is 'Making Best Use of the Existing Housing Stock'. This involves actions to improve the fabric of the existing housing stock, in particular to improve energy efficiency, reducing the carbon footprint of the existing stock, increasing adaptability to climate change and reducing fuel poverty.			
Bedford Borough's Joint Health and Wellbeing Strategy	Bedford Borough Health and Wellbeing Board named 'working in partnership to address fuel poverty' one of its primary objectives in the Joint Health and Wellbeing Strategy 2014-16. An update to this strategy is being developed for summer 2017.
