Description of activity:

The Adults Commissioning Service currently provides funding to third sector organisations through a combination of commissioned services and grants. Generally, this funding is intended to enable third sector organisations to provide support services to residents that the Council would otherwise be obliged to provide support to directly under its statutory responsibilities.

A review of the services currently funded has been conducted taking into account the requirement of the new Care Act 2014 which came into effect from April 2015. As a result of the review it is proposed to discontinue the provision of Adult Commissioning Service funding for Bedford Guild House (£14,252 for 2015/16) because it is not providing services that the Council is required to meet under the Care Act.

In addition it is also proposed that the Council's Third Sector funding is discontinued (£10,000 for 2015/15).

The Guild House is a membership organisation providing social activities and support for over 50's. Non-members may also take part in the activities on a pay as you go basis. There are 4 part time members of staff and around 50 volunteers including 4 with Learning Disability or Autism. Around 500 over-50s attend the activities monthly.

Most members are not eligible for adults social care support at this moment but are in the at risk group to become eligible in the future. The services provided by the Guild House help to prevent many of those risks being realised and generating future needs for funded social care.

Adjustments required		The proposal is to discontinue Adult Commissioning Service funding (£14,252) and Third Sector funding (£10,000) for Bedford Guild House from April 2016. This would have a negative equality effect on older people aged over 50 years who access the services provided by the Bedford Guild House as it is likely the complete cessation of Council funding would probably result in closure of the service.
	х	To lessen the overall negative equality impact, for any third sector grant recipient, an emergency hardship fund is being established as part of this proposal. This will enable cash limited assistance to be provided in the unlikely event that due solely to the change to the Council's funding arrangements the organisation is unable to avoid closure or very significantly reducing its services. Bedford Guild House is able to apply to the emergency hardship fund whilst they establish more sustainable sources of funding or take other actions to address the reduction in income.

	In addition, as recommended through the consultation, Council officers will work with organisations where possible to signpost to potential external funding bodies and infrastructure support organisations.

Summary of analysis

In preparing this report, due consideration has been given to the Borough Council's statutory Equality Duty to eliminate unlawful discrimination, advance equality of opportunity and foster good relations, as set out in Section 149(1) of the Equality Act 2010.

The equality analysis is based on evidence from contract monitoring information, service user data, public consultation and specific consultation with Bedford Guild House.

The equality analysis recommendation is that adjustments are required to the proposal. The complete cessation of Council funding would probably result in closure of the service with negative equality impact on older people aged 50 and over. In addition, this would likely result in a future increase of preventable demand for social care and health services. The partial cessation of funding is probably survivable by the Guild House and would enable the continued operation of this preventative service.

Appendix A: Consultation on Proposed Changes to Funding for Third Sector Organisations, Bedford Guild House Monday 30 November 2015

Background

The Guild House is a membership organisation providing social activities and support for over 50's. Non-members may also take part in the activities on a pay as you go basis. There are 4 part time members of staff and around 50 volunteers including 4 with Learning Disability or Autism. Around 500 over-50s attend the activities monthly.

Subscription is £20 a year and pay as you go is £1 a session. Basic state pension is the source of income for most attenders and they are not usually eligible for social care support.

The Guild House helps to prevent loneliness and isolation. For many members it is their only social interaction. Friendships are supported which contribute to mental and physical wellbeing. Cooked lunches (paid for) are available daily and popular.

While not possible to quantify it seems likely that a reduction in Guild House activity may, in the medium to long term, lead to an increase in demand for social services for older people in the form of attendance at Council day centres or provision of home care.

Implications of 10.2% budget savings and ways to reduce impact

- 1. Board have discussed possibilities of raising charges and/or reducing hours of paid staff and/or making redundancies.
- 2. Do not have sufficient reserves to pay redundancies. Finances are hand to mouth although budget is controlled to the extent that break-even is achieved each year.
- 3. Have made the building available to other users at weekends and out of hours. Raises some funds but brings problems re how the building is left afterwards.
- 4. Council funding is key to ability to access other funds.
- 5. The Guild House could probably cope with the loss of the 10k grant if transitional relief was made available but probably not cope if the loss of the 10k was combined with the loss of the adults commissioning 14k.
- 6. The building is leased to the Guild House by the Council and that rent receipt would be lost to the Council if the Guild House closes.

7. If the service continues then the Guild House would seek renegotiation of the lease on the basis they have improved the buildi a garage and store have been demolished.
